ABOUT THE ASIA PACIFIC MEDIATION FORUM

The Asia Pacific Mediation Form (APMF) is a not-for-profit regional association of individuals, organizations and institutions interested in interpersonal, inter-group, community, trans-cultural and international mediation and conflict management. It is committed to the use of mediation and other appropriate conflict management processes wherever conflicts threaten the well being of individuals, organizations, communities, and local, state or national governments in the region. The APMF encourages the exchange of information related to mediation and conflict management on its website and at regional conferences.

OBJECTIVE OF THE APMF

The main objective of the APMF is to facilitate the exchange and development of knowledge, values and skills of mediation and conflict management in any form, including inter-cultural, interpersonal, inter-institutional and international, within and between the diverse countries and cultures in the Asia Pacific Region. To fulfil this objective, conferences will be held

in the region every two years, with a different country taking responsibility for hosting each conference.

APMF CONFERENCES TO DATE



The inaugural APMF conference was held from 29 November to 1 December 2001 at the University of South Australia, Adelaide. The theme of this Forum was *Reconciliation: Conversations Beyond Cultural Boundaries*. Some 300 participants attended from 21 different countries in the region and Dr Jose Ramos Horta was one of our Keynote speakers (see above). The second successful conference was held in Singapore from 19 - 22 November 2003 with the theme of *Developing a Mediation Culture*.

The WMF was created in Dublin, Ireland in 1993 as the result of the First International Conference on Mediation and it was formally constituted at the Assembly celebrated at the First World Mediation Forum congress at El

Escorial, Spain in 1995. The second, third and fourth congresses were convened in Havana, Cuba in 1998 and Sardinia, Italy in 2000 and Buenos Aires, Argentina in 2003. The WMF Steering Committee is encouraging the establishment of regional forums around the world. Where possible, the regional conferences will take place in the years between the bi-annual WMF conferences. Members of the APMF who are attending a WMF global conference are invited to join an APMF Delegation, which will have voting rights at the General Assembly of the WMF.

The APMF and the WMF are now growing impressively as global and regional associations of mediators and offer a tremendous resource through international and regional networking. One of the major strengths of both the APMF and the WMF are that they are not associated with any one country. The members of the Steering Committees are elected bi-annually from different countries from all parts of the globe and the bi-annual conferences move from one country to another, thereby avoiding domination by any one nation or cultural group.

The location of the Third APMF Forum (1996) is currently being negotiated. PROFILES OF SOME OF THE APMF STEERING COMMITTEE MEMBERS



Rachel Aquino ("Che"), a citizen of the Philippines, became involved in conflict resolution issues beginning in 1994, as Programme Officer of The Asia Foundation (TAF). As Programme Officer of TAF, Che helped implement a 20-grant justice portfolio worth US\$2.5 Million from 1994-1999. Part of this portfolio was a ground-breaking effort to look at community disputes through joint government-civil society partnerships in two areas: agrarian reform, and environment and natural resources. These two projects trained over a thousand trainers and mediators in agrarian and natural resource disputes all over the country. The core of these trainers and mediators, including her, established the Mediators Network for Sustainable Peace (MedNet) in 1999. MedNet promotes the use of empowering dispute resolution processes (i.e. mediation, conciliation, negotiation, and negotiation coaching) as viable approaches to disputes.

Che was elected MedNet's Board Officer in 1998 and has since then been actively involved in training mediators, and in mediation and facilitation of agrarian, community, and organizational disputes.

Che has a Masters degree in Public Administration (major in Public Policy and Program Administration).

Dale Bagshaw, PhD, M.Soc.Admin. (the APMF President) is the Director of the Conflict Management Research Group (<http://www.unisa.edu.au/cmrg>) at the University of South Australia and is also the Program Director of the Professional Doctorate in Human Services Research, Master and Graduate Diploma in Conflict Management and the Graduate Certificate in Mediation (<http://www.unisa.edu.au/course>) Dale is the past President and current Vice-President of the World Mediation Forum. Dale has played a

leading role in the development of mediation in Australia, including convening the first national Mediation Conference in 1992, the Second International Mediation Conference in 1996 and the inaugural APMF conference in 2001. She established the South Australian Dispute Resolution Association which she chaired from 1988-1999. Dale has conducted many mediation training workshops and consultancies across Australia, in the Asia Pacific and in Europe. She has presented numerous international and national conference papers and published widely in books and refereed journals

Michael Belsky, Ed.D., L.P.C., has over 20 years of experience as a professional mediator, licensed professional counsellor, facilitator and educator. He is presently the Program Director for the Mediation and Dispute Resolution Program at Southern Oregon University. Dr. Belsky helped found and is currently on the Board of Mediation Works, one of the largest Community Mediation Programs in the Northwest Region

of the United States. He was a founding member and past president of the Oregon Association of Family Court Services whose members provide mediation services for families in the State of Oregon. He has been on the faculty of Governors State University, San Jose State University and Friends World College.

Naniette Coleman Before her election as the first student member of the APMF Steering committee in 2003, Naniette H. Coleman served as a Fellow in a CASE award-winning program for exceptional minority students in the University at Buffalo's (UB) Office of University Advancement and Development. Ms. Coleman worked in Corporate and Foundation Relations, Major gifts, Annual programs and Planned giving and founded "The Random Acts of Kindness Fund" a special fund which provides temporary support for students who encounter life changing difficulties. Prior to her work at UB, Naniette worked as a Senior Consultant to the New York State Department of Health's Youth Partnership for Health program and as a member of the Youth Advisory Council to the New York State Commission on National and Community Service. In addition to her background in Development Naniette has a background in conflict resolution, mediation and negotiation and co-authored a negotiation exercise at Harvard called "Rigs to Reefs." Ms. Coleman decided to attend Harvard University so that she could study conflict and resolution strategies in greater depth. She is a graduate of the International Institute for Mediation and Conflict Resolution's Latin American Symposium and a Consultant for the Development Consulting Network. Naniette will obtain a Master of Public Policy at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University with a concentration in International Security and Political Economy in 2006.

Justice Ambeng Kandakasi is a Papua New Guinean citizen. He is the Vice President of the Forum and is a founding member of the Forum. He was instrumental in the drafting, acceptance and eventual registration of the constitution of the Asia Pacific Forum. On the 1st of November 2000, Justice Ambeng Kandakasi was appointed a justice of both the Supreme and National Courts of Justices of Papua New Guinea. Before his appointment, he practiced law as a partner of the firm of Young & Williams based in Port Moresby the capital city of Papua New Guinea. He has been a practitioner for nine years before his appointment to the Bench. Prior to that, he was a teaching fellow and later a lecture in law at the University of Papua New Guinea. He holds a master's degree in Law from the University of San Diego, in Southern California, USA, a qualification he acquired in 1990. His first degree is a Bachelor of Laws degree from the University of Papua New Guinea, awarded in March of 1987. He has attended a number of workshops and trainings in a number of areas of the law, ADR and his role as a Justice. Justice Kandakasi is strong advocate of ADR. This is reflected in his appointment as Chairman of the Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee set up jointly by the judiciary and legal practitioners in Papua New Guinea. He is a member of the PNG judiciary's Judicial Education Committee and also a member of that judiciary's faculty of trainers and actively participates in those roles. He has been instrumental in drafting changes to the Papua New Guinea National Court Rules to formally introduce ADR in that Court which is the second highest Court of Papua New Guinea.

Ian Macduff is Director, NZ Centre for Conflict Resolution, Faculty of Law, Victoria University of Wellington. He is an independent mediator and trainer in a number of fields, ranging from commercial, to environmental, community-based, family, Treaty and Maori Fisheries, tenancy, medical disciplinary, organisational and others. He has been a consultant and trainer for a number of organisations and government departments, including very early involvement in establishing mediation practices and systems

under statutory regimes. He has been consultant and trainer for the World Health Organisation for a capacity building programme in Sri Lanka from 1999 to 2001 and again in 2004. He is co-editor of *Ethnic Conflict and Secessionism in South and South East Asia* (Sage, 2003); co-author of *Dispute Resolution in New Zealand* (OUP 1999), and of *Guidelines for Family Mediation* (Butterworths, 1995).
